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1. University of Rwanda, Rwanda

The University of Rwanda is the only public university in Rwanda, formed in 2013 through the merger of Rwanda's previously independent public universities. The university has five science faculties: Agriculture, Veterinary Medicine, Technology and Applied Sciences, ICT, Commerce and Applied Economics, and a centre for Communication and Languages. Funded by the Talloires Network's Youth Economic Participation Initiative and in partnership with the University of Nairobi in Kenya, Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences in Tanzania and Makerere University in Uganda, UoR has designed and implemented a short course on entrepreneurship to science UG and PG students and established a small business incubation center. <http://www.cavm.ur.ac.rw/sasvm/>

Opportunities for collaboration

- A. *Student exchange:* To expose students to entrepreneurship in a different context and to build students' international mindset, UoR seeks university partnerships for student exchange (incoming and outgoing) especially on high-tech, technology-driven entrepreneurship. A suitable duration would be two weeks up to a month.
- B. *Faculty exchange:* This will help UoR faculty to interact, share and exchange ideas with others on how best to teach entrepreneurship. As part of visiting UoR, visiting academics could help further develop entrepreneurship curricula and engage in faculty development on entrepreneurship education. The ideal duration would be 1-2 month.

Dr Peter Paul Kithae - Director, Research, Development and Innovations
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 Background: Dr. Peter Paul Kithae is currently the Director, Research, Development and Innovations of the MUA; the honorary treasurer for the Kenya Red Cross Society, Upper Eastern Kenya Region and a Senior Consultant with the TQM firm of Consultants. He worked as a district Youth Officer for five years, and is a renowned educationist. He has written one print book and over 15 publications in refereed journals on the topics; entrepreneurship and small business management, Youth and technology adoption as well as innovations and women entrepreneurs.

Opportunities for collaboration

- A. *Incubator design and management:* The university hopes to launch an incubator in January 2018. Applying an accelerator model, the university will select and support 25 entrepreneurs over the course of three months. To successfully implement to incubator MUA seeks advise from incubator experts to help set up the incubator, design the incubation model, policies and practice. Learning course talk place either through a field visit (them visiting a UK campus/ incubator to learn first-hand; an incubator expert visiting the university for a short academic exchange or virtual mentorship to the incubator management team.
- B. *Faculty exchange:* MUA faculty is interested to interact, share and exchange ideas with others on how best to teach entrepreneurship. Visiting academics could help write an entrepreneurship curriculum, conduct collaborative research with MAU Business School faculty (three PhD holders + four Master degree holders), engage in faculty development or teach entrepreneurship to students. The minimum duration for visiting MUA is one month (ideally one semester) and can be one-to-one exchange or a group visit (semester dates: Sept- Dec; Jan-April; May- Aug).
- C. *Collaborative research on Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise (MSME)*
 - MSEs are engines of growth, and therefore vital to most economies. In 2014, 80% of jobs created in Kenya were dominated by SMEs. They are characterized with low performances and lack of growth and with majority of them being unable to survive beyond three years. MAU is seeking research collaborations in the field of MSME development, ranging from joint research idea development, co-writing.
 - Secondly, MUA is looking for an experienced entrepreneurship educator to conduct and impact assessment of MAU's entrepreneurship programs and modules.

3. Karatina University, Kenya

Karatina University is a public university with five Academic Schools: Agriculture and Biotechnology; Business; Education and Social Sciences; Natural Resources and Environmental Studies; Pure and Applied Sciences. The Business School has four Departments, including the Business and Entrepreneurship; Human Resources Development; Tourism and Hospitality Management; and Economics. The Business School has three faculty members specialising in entrepreneurship. Opportunities for collaboration

- A. *Faculty exchange:* To expose their faculty members to different cultures and to build their entrepreneurship expertise through peer-learning Karatina University seeks opportunities for faculty exchange (incoming and outgoing), especially in the area of social entrepreneurship and corporate entrepreneurship. Visiting faculty can engage in collaborative research, faculty development and/or postgraduate student supervision. The ideal duration would be one semester, but shorter periods are possible.
- B. *Collaborative research:* Karatina University faculty have already conducted research in the field of entrepreneurship education, including a study on the impact of entrepreneurship training in technical and vocational schools in Kenya, as well as a study on start-up rates among BSc Entrepreneurship graduates. Karatina faculty are looking for research collaborators to conduct further research in the field.
- C. *Development of local teaching materials:* Karatina University utilizes international text books to teach entrepreneurship, and faculty members are interested to work with international collaborators to develop more locally contextualised teaching materials including but not limited to case studies of local enterprises.

- B. *Social Innovation:* Studies indicate that most of the problems facing developing countries like Kenya can more readily be addressed by social innovation yet most institutions of higher learning are currently focused on high-tech entrepreneurship and business technology programs. - C. *Science Park:* Most businesses in Kenya fall under the SME sector and statistics indicate that almost 80% of them do not survive past their 3rd year. This is mostly due to harsh business environment. In recent years, a number of "Science Parks" have started operating across Kenya to spur a conducive micro climate for the survival of SMEs. However, their impact is unknown and managers lack technical skills to manage a Science Park effectively. TMU seeks collaboration partners to conduct research on science parks in Kenya, to influence policy as well as to identify avenues to further develop them.
